Leadership Position Description

Assistant Senior Patrol Leader

General Information

Type: Appointed by the Senior Patrol Leader with the approval of the Scoutmaster.

Term: 6 months

Reports to: Senior Patrol Leader and assigned Assistant Scoutmaster.

Description: The Assistant Senior Patrol Leader is the second highest ranking patrol leader in the troop. The Assistant Senior Patrol Leader acts as the Senior Patrol Leader in the absence of the SPL or when called upon. He also provides leadership to other junior leaders in the troop.

Comments: The most important part of the ASPL position is his work with the other junior leaders. The ASPL should be familiar with the other positions and stay current with the work being done.

Qualifications

Age: Minimum 13 years old

Rank: Star or higher

Experience: Previous service as SPL, ASPL, PL, or APL

Performance Requirements

Training: You must attend the troop Junior Leader Training even if you have attended in the past.

Attendance: As a leader in the Troop, regular participation is expected at Troop Leadership Committee meetings, weekly troop meetings, patrol meetings, special events and campouts.

Specific Leadership Responsibilities

- Helps lead meetings and activities as called upon by the Senior Patrol Leader.
- Runs the troop in the absence of the Senior Patrol Leader.
- Helps train and give direct leadership to the following appointed junior leaders: Troop Scribe, Quartermaster, Instructor(s), Librarian, Historian and Chaplain's Aide.
- Performs duties and responsibilities assigned by the Senior Patrol Leader. Help the SPL in performing all his duties.
- Serves as a member of the Troop Leadership Committee.
- Attends troop meetings, campouts, monthly TLC meetings and other troop activities.
- Works with younger Scouts to meet leadership and advancement goals.
- Assist the next ASPL's transition.

General Leadership Responsibilities

Uniform: Set the example by wearing your uniform correctly.

Behavior: Set a good example by living the Scout Oath and Law in your everyday life. Show Scout Spirit in everything you say and do.

Attendance: Set the example by being an active Scout. Be on-time for meetings and activities. You must call the Scoutmaster or Senior Patrol Leader if you are not going to be at a meeting or if you suddenly have to miss an outing in which you're expected to serve in your position. You also need to make sure that someone will assume your responsibilities and is prepared.
